You can be excited and sad. You can be organized and overwhelmed. You can celebrate their future while quietly wishing time would slow down.

- A little shocked by how quickly it went.
- Overwhelmed by all the dates and expenses.
- Desperate for a meaningful photo where they look like themselves.
- Ready to celebrate, but not quite ready to let go.

Celebrate the person

- What they love right now
- What makes them laugh
- What they are proud of
- What you admire most
- What you want them to remember



How to survive the eye rolls.

Your senior may not fully understand why this year feels so big to you.

They are looking forward. You are holding the whole story: the baby years, the school years, the hard years, all of the proud years. So yes, some of you may care more about the announcements, the keepsakes, and the memory-making right now. That does not make you too much. It makes you mom.

Give them a voice. Let them be part of the decisions. Have support during the portrait process. Get what you need and love and what they want.





"I want this to feel like you. I also want to remember this season well. Let's find someone who can help us both feel good about the process."

Sometimes it helps to have another adult step in - someone who has been through it and can guide you both, encourage them, and help them feel confident without it feeling like mom is making one more request.



What your senior secretly needs this year.



To feel respected.

To have some control.

To be celebrated without being embarrassed.

To know you are proud of who they are, not just what they achieve.

To feel confident in this almost-adult version of themselves.

To have moments that are not just for them.



Senior year is a bridge. They are still yours, but they are also becoming their own. That can make this year feel tender for everyone.

This is why a senior portrait experience should never feel like a transaction. It should feel personal, guided, and thoughtful. Around here, the goal is not to make every senior look the same. The goal is to help them feel seen as they want to be seen



Mom, you deserve to be in the story too.



Moms are usually the ones taking the pictures, planning the things, remembering the deadlines, and holding the emotional weight of the year. But you are part of this story too.

One day, your senior will want to see you there - loving them, cheering for them, standing beside them at the edge of this new chapter.

During senior sessions, I always make space for a simple, meaningful mom-and-senior portrait if you want one.

Nothing forced. Nothing awkward. Just a quiet reminder that this milestone belongs to both of you.



The Do Not Miss List

The final year gets busy but don't miss these

- Write them a letter before graduation. (Bonus points if you let me in on this, I have a very special way to incorporate the letter into thier senior portrait session)
- The first day and the last day of school photo.
- Save a voicemail or a text that feels like them.
- Ask about their favorite high school memory.
- Let them choose one senior year tradition.
- Get in at least one photo with them.
- Plan a weekend getaway together, make a couple more memories.
- Celebrate who they are, not only what they have accomplished.
- Pause wherever you can before graduation day arrives.
- Tell them what you see in them.
